

# 2021 INPACT REPORT



One of the most powerful tools a family can have is stability. For the last decade, the Siemer Institute has invested in families, providing them with the skills and resources they need to have stable homes and stable incomes.

#### Because when families are stable, children can be successful in school.

The Siemer Institute was officially launched in 2011, but the work started long before then. In the mid-90's, Barbara Siemer set out to determine why reading proficiency was so low in her local district. She met with the school's superintendent to review the test scores of a 6th grade class. She discovered that within the class, only 19 of 100 students were proficient.

This gave Barbara pause. How could only 19 students be proficient? The school principal explained that out of 100 students, only three kids started and finished the year in the same school.

The root of the proficiency issue was identified. Each time a child moves schools, it results in detrimental academic outcomes. That's why the Siemer Institute invests in family stability — **because when we keep families in their homes, we can keep children in their schools**.

The first beta site to address evictions and work to stabilize families was established in 2003. For five years, protocols were developed which helped families remain in their homes and create financial stability. In 2008, as the recession approached, the program grew to 10 cities in Ohio and Florida. As our success was demonstrated in these cities, the decision was made to hire a national director and expand across the nation, targeting the largest cities where evictions and mobility were the most severe. Thus, the Siemer Institute was formally established as a separate entity with a formal board of directors, an advisory council, and national United Way support.

In 2021, we celebrated our 10th anniversary. Over the years, a lot of people took our small idea and ran with it. We are proud of the willingness of our partners — within our network and beyond — to believe in this initiative. By working together, 97% of families served did not have a disruptive school move in 2021.

In 50 years, people won't remember who started the Siemer Institute. What they will remember is **are the parents who increased their earning capacity to have stable footing; the students who are thriving in school because they feel safe; the local programs that have enough funding to ensure hundreds of families in their communities are on an upward trajectory**.

There is beauty in collaboration. To our funding partners and program partners — we could not do this work without you. You are the boots on the ground, the frontline collective, and the best advocates for family stability. Families and communities across the nation are stronger because of this critical work.

We can't wait to see what the next ten years bring.

## FAMILY SUCCESS STORY



Hana is a 38-year-old Hispanic/Latinx mother living in California with her husband and 7-year-old daughter. Hana's husband works in construction and Hana stays at home to help her daughter who has had a physical disability since birth.

With a single income and a child with special needs, finances were tight. So tight that Hana, her husband, and her daughter were sharing an apartment with Hana's sister and her family. To help improve her family's financial situation, Hana enrolled in a financial literacy workshop where she learned about SparkPoint, a program partner of the Siemer Institute. SparkPoint helps lowincome families in need meet their basic needs, increase their income, build their credit, increase their savings, and reduce their debt.

Hana and her husband strived to manage their bills well because they hoped to someday purchase a home to provide more space and security for their daughter. When Hana began working one-on-one with SparkPoint's financial case manager, she shared her goals of improving her budgeting skills and increasing her savings so that she could become a homeowner. Upon learning of Hana's goals, her case manager jumped into action to provide the coaching and guidance needed to make her dreams a reality.

While working with her case manager, Hana and her husband began the process to become legal U.S. residents. Her husband received a work permit, which enabled him to join a labor union and increase his earnings. They were one step closer towards achieving their goal of purchasing their own home.

Through SparkPoint, Hana learned about the factors that affect credit, established and maintained a household budget, and increased her savings by \$6,000 over six months' time. With the encouragement and motivation of her Financial Case Manager, Hana and her husband were able to fulfill their dream of purchasing a home in San Bernardino County.

# A SUCCESSFUL YEAR


Families enrolled in our Family Stability Initiative share one common goal — a brighter, more promising future for their children. Our work is carried out to keep families in their homes, help increase their financial stability, and, ultimately, to keep students in their schools.

In 2021, as the COVID-19 pandemic continued, the Siemer Institute demonstrated successful results for those served.

7% increase in families and children enrolled in the Siemer Institute Family Stability initiative from 2020.	<b>3,458</b> families successfully reached their goals and completed the program.
97% of children were stable in school.	71% of families served remained enrolled in the Family Stability Initiative.
67% of families are housing stable.	31% of families increased their income.

## **Equitable Outcomes**

The Siemer Institute network delivered equitable outcomes. The 2021 program completion rates did not vary significantly among client demographics, as outlined below.

# **OUTCOMES DRIVEN APPROACH**

Families come to us on the edge of homelessness and in a crisis. We help keep them right where they belong — in their own homes.

Through our Family Stability Initiative, the Siemer Institute works to prevent unplanned moves that disrupt students' education. We work with United Ways across the nation to fund local programs through mission-aligned organizations that help families thrive. As the driving force behind our work, our partners bring our initiative to life within each community we serve.


Each program takes its own approach, but at their core they each work toward the same goals — stable housing, stable schooling, and higher income. Programs that receive support from the Siemer Institute use funding to connect adults and children to a variety of services that help bring about longer-term stability.

Our work is based on an evidence-based framework that finds it is significantly more costly to help families who become homeless than it is to keep them in their homes. Funding spent on stability efforts improves the lives of those we serve while reducing the number of families that may need more expensive interventions in the future.

That's why our initiative is preventative, not reactive. Rather than serving as a temporary solution, we aim to permanently disrupt the cycle of poverty by intervening at critical moments to stabilize families. Our main priority is to help families remain in their current homes, but if that option is not possible, we provide support for a planned move and assist with school transitions. Once families are stable, we can then work with them to plan for their future success.

By focusing on stabilizing the entire family, we follow a two-generation (2-gen) approach that is proven to create lasting change in the lives of both children and adults.

The programs we fund deliver services that strengthen the whole family to ensure that all generations — and all future generations — will experience improved economic, housing, and educational outcomes for years to come.

# 2021 OUTCOMES

# **INCOME STABILITY**

**49%** of families who successfully completed the program could meet their basic needs without subsidies.

**27%** of families had sufficient and stable income that was well managed, discretionary income, and the ability to save money, compared to only 17% at the first assessment of the year.

# HOUSING STABILITY


81% of families who successfully completed the program were stably housed in either subsidized (24%) or unsubsidized (57%) housing.

# EDUCATIONAL STABILITY

**90%** of children from families who successfully completed the program attended school regularly.

97% of families served in the program did not have a disruptive school move.

Note: The Arizona Self-Sufficiency Matrix was developed by the Arizona Homeless Evaluation Project to create a reliable and valid measure that evaluates individuals' level of independence and quality of life. The Siemer Institute utilizes the ASSM to assess education stability, housing stability, and income stability for the families we serve.

# **2021 PARTNER SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS**

Big wins, little victories, temporary setbacks — we know it's all part of the process when working to truly change our communities. That's why the Siemer Institute is there every step of the way. We work with our partners to address holistically the needs of families living in poverty.

We know that we are only successful when our partners can achieve collective goals and outcomes. The following opportunities are available to our partners and what we view as benefits of belonging to the Siemer Institute network.

## **Annual Summit**

In 2021, we held our national summit that brought together our partners from across the country for an afternoon of virtual learning and connection. The Siemer Institute Summit featured keynote speakers, panel discussions, and learning tracks for United Way partners and program partners. Topics ranged from insights on 2-gen programming to prioritizing self-care.

In addition to hearing from experts, attendees connected with their peers from across the country. With an average attendance of 200 partners, participants met to build relationships within the network and share best practices from their communities.

## **Communities of Practice**

Communities of practice are groups of people who share a passion for what they do and learn how to do it better by regularly interacting with one another. The Siemer Institute's community of practice is built to foster learning from each other through open and active communication.

In 2021, we hosted three network-wide communities of practice to strengthen relationships, strengthen knowledge, and strengthen skills. Topics of discussion included federal funding opportunities, COVID-19 recovery, and the CDC eviction moratorium, among others. Each session averaged 150 participants and was consistently rated "high value" across the network.

In addition to these discussions, we hosted a successful virtual meeting with CEOs from partner United Ways to determine how the Siemer Institute network can best utilize its collective voice to support low-income families.

We believe that the opportunity for our partners to learn from one another is a critical element of success.

## National Data Platform

Evaluating programs, measuring impact, and conducting research are critical to our shared impact on families.

In 2021, the Siemer Institute recognized the need to update our data-collection and reporting infrastructure to streamline the process for grant reporting and to increase the quality and confidence of data collected.

We implemented the SureImpact platform to connect all our partners and be able to scale as we continue to grow. Having access to data at the client level, as well as the regional and national levels, has allowed us to analyze results and turn that information into learning opportunities that can be shared across our network.

As a research-based organization, our data platform is critical to ensure that we have both historical and realtime information to aid in decision making, planning, and execution.

#### PROGRAM PARTNER EARLY CHILDHOOD RESOURCE NETWORK+

— Samantha Stewart, Executive Director, Early Childhood Resource Network+ The Early Childhood Resource Network+ (ECRN+) is a program of the YMCA of Central Ohio that empowers and connects families. As a program partner of the Siemer Institute, ECRN+ delivers the Stable Families program, which helps families to build and maintain stable environments where children can grow and thrive.

Created in 2018, ECRN+'s Stable Families program intentionally focuses on improving school stability, maintaining secure and appropriate housing, and increasing engagement to promote long-term success for families in Columbus, Ohio. The Siemer Institute provided ECRN+ with an initial investment to support 150 families in its first year. Seeing the promise of the program, the Siemer Institute provided additional funding to increase the number of families served to 600 families per year in 2019. Then COVID-19 hit, and more families were facing instability than ever before.

To address the ongoing effects of the pandemic, ECRN+ now serves over 1,000 Central Ohio families each year through the Stable Families program.

The success of the Stable Families program is credited to the transparency, trust, and open communication between ECRN+ and the Siemer Institute. When it got too difficult for ECRN+'s case managers to manage coordinators, a partial case load, and the data entry process, they communicated the need to the Siemer Institute and hired a compliance position to manage client data, which helped enhance the program's capacity to serve more families experiencing instability.

In just three short years, ECRN+ grew at an exceptional rate to improve the financial, housing, and educational stability for families in Columbus. Through a strong partnership with the Siemer Institute, ECRN+ will continue to move the needle on addressing instability within the community.

# **2021 INCREASED IMPACT**

For 2021, the Siemer Institute's total network investment — including the funding we provide to program partners and their investment — totaled \$22,725,000. This investment increased the Siemer Institute network's impact by 25% in 2021.

The total network investment averaged around \$1,663 for each family served. Based on government estimations, one unhoused individual can require \$30,000 to \$50,000 per year in public services. Therefore, keeping a family in their home through our Family Stability Initiative is significantly more cost effective than supporting a family when they become homeless.

The program completion rate for families enrolled in our Family Stability Initiative was 88% for 2021. Families that successfully completed the program had larger improvements in housing and education stability.

# FUNDING PARTNER

UNITED WAY OF GREATER AUSTIN



"Every community and local need are different. It creates the opportunity for better, more transformational work." — David Smith, CEO, United Way for Greater Austin The United Way of Greater Austin (UWGA) fights poverty by bringing people, ideas, and resources together. United Way of Greater Austin partners with the Siemer Institute to identify and fund programs in Austin that help families in poverty live more stable lives.

As a Siemer Institute funding partner, UWGA raises matching funds that amplify the Siemer Institute's investment to create long-term impact throughout the community. As a result, partners like UWGA can leverage public funding with private fundraising dollars. This "braiding" of private and public funding creates a diverse and sustainable revenue mix for the family stability programs supported by the Siemer Institute.

Like many funding partners, UWGA receives Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding to help families at risk of homelessness. But as our nation responded to the impact of the pandemic, UWGA saw another opportunity to secure federal dollars when the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) was signed into law to support the economic recovery of local communities.

UWGA sought the Siemer Institute's support to hire a consultant to support ARPA-related advocacy efforts. As a result of these efforts, the City of Austin and Travis County committed more than \$15 million towards family support services.

This significant investment of federal dollars paired with Siemer Institute funds will drive Austin's post COVID-19 economic recovery while addressing some of the root causes of instability in the community.

# **10 YEARS OF NATIONAL IMPACT**



Over the last ten years, the Siemer Institute has been a catalyst for creating positive change in the lives of the children and families we serve. Each day across the country, we are providing parents with the support, resources, and knowledge they need to strengthen their lives and help their children thrive.

Prior to the Siemer Institute's formal establishment in 2011, initial investments from Barbara and Al Siemer included \$500,000 from 2003 to 2008 and \$1,500,000 from 2008 to 2011.

Since 2018, our investments across the network have totaled \$66,948,750. Our funding is amplified through partner matches in every community we serve. A snapshot of our total network investments from the past four years is as follows:
